Chapter 10: Treat Others as Yourself

I watched the disciples squabble over whose turn it was to clean up after dinner. It was a familiar argument. My brothers, sisters, and I had it often. Even when I knew it was my turn, I would still try to get out of it. I would mysteriously disappear, or volunteer do something for my dad, so that they couldn't get mad that I wasn't doing the dishes.

My mom was never very amused with our after-dinner arguments. I am beginning to wonder if she wasn't tired from everything she did for us and just wanted to rest after dinner. Instead she had to referee her children into doing their chores. My guess is that Jesus wasn't fond of arguing either.

Thinking about arguing with my siblings made me miss them even more. This adventure was turning out to be so much more than I ever imagined it would be, but I still longed for home. I wondered what would be different when I went home again.

Abraham seemed at peace since he had decided to stay. He was even more interested in everything Jesus said. I often caught him scribbling in his notebook and scratching his whiskers as he contemplated Jesus' latest teaching.

Jesus had said something very strange the other day. It was quite short, but from the way he said it I figured it was very important. He said, "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets."

Abraham and I had been trying to work out what Jesus meant when he said the *law and the prophets*. We kept waiting for someone to visit who was called the prophet, but no one came. We wondered if we had slept through something important. There didn't seem to be any scroll that Jesus was referring to as he spoke. The leaders of the synagogue often referred to scrolls when they talked, but Jesus just seemed to know what he needed to say.

Then we heard some of the disciples talking and realized that when Jesus said the law and the prophets, he was saying that was what God wanted us to do. If we were going to obey God, then we needed to do what the law and prophets told us. It seemed that we also needed to listen to what Jesus said, if we were going to be obedient to God.

"Abraham," I asked one evening, "what do you think Jesus meant when he said we were to treat others as we want to be treated?"

Abraham was quiet for a bit, but I knew he was listening. He wasn't as quick to answer as he had been. I think he knew that the answer wasn't easy, yet it was important. Finally, he said, "I think it means that however we would like someone to treat us, is the way we treat them."

I will admit I rolled my eyes. He was just quoting Jesus. He didn't know anymore than I did what it meant to actually live out, "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you."

Later that evening, I really wanted a snack. I could hear my stomach rumbling. A tasty morsel of grain would really hit the spot. I thought about how nice it would be if I was home and mom was setting out a warm bowl of popped grain for all of us to share. Snacks always tasted better when someone else made them.

All of a sudden, Jesus' voice popped in my head: "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you. I felt like Jesus was speaking those words again. I momentarily forgot that I was hungry as I pondered what Jesus' words could possibly mean. As I sat there confused, I looked up and saw Abraham and I wondered if he was hungry. Could Jesus be saying that I should get Abraham a snack? Could it be as easy as that?

I wasn't really sure but decided that I would get a snack and share it with Abraham. He seemed surprised when I sat down next to him and offered him some grain. We laughed together about how I couldn't figure out how Mom always made it taste so good.

I was worried that Abraham would think I was going crazy but decided to tell him about hearing Jesus' voice in my head, anyway. He listened closely as I talked but did not seem too surprised.

"Malachi," he said, "I think Jesus was trying to help you understand what he was talking about when he said treat others as you want to be treated. What do you think he meant?"

Taking a cue from Abraham, I didn't answer immediately, but thought over Jesus' words and what had happened. "I think he was saying that we should put others first. If we treat people like we want to be treated, then we will love them, take care of them, and make sure they have what they need. I think we have to reach out to other people and care for them."

"I think you must be right. When I think about what I want, I want to have friends, be loved, have enough to eat, to be safe, to name a few. It seems like Jesus is saying, I need to be a friend if I want a friend, I need to help others know they are loved, I can help others feel safe and have enough to eat. I need to help others experience the very things I want in my life," Abraham answered.

As we crawled into our nests that night, I thought about how different it would have been at home if I had treated my siblings as I wanted them to treat me. I asked God to forgive me and promised him I would try to do better. I wanted to obey the law and prophets. I wanted to live like God wanted me to. Following God was changing me. I wonder if they will recognize me when I finally get home.
